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Kenya Healthcare Federation Marks 11th Annual General Meeting

Kenya Healthcare Federation (KHF), Health Sector Board of Kenya Private Sector Alliance (KEPSA) held its 11th Annual General Meeting (AGM) on 27th June 2019 at Villa Rosa Kempinsky Hotel in Nairobi. The meeting brought together health sector partners including: Ministry of Health (MOH), Christian Health Association of Kenya (CHAK), Health NGOs Network (HENNET) and Council of Governors (COG) Parliamentary Health Committee. The meeting was sponsored by Marie Stopes Kenya and Amref Health Africa. As the federation marked the end of the 10th AGM, Dr. Amit N. Thakker, chairman of Kenya Healthcare Federation, together with other private health sector leaders, including: Dr. Samuel Mwenda, secretary general of the Christian Health Association of Kenya (CHAK); Dr. Cosmas Mugambi of MOH; Ms. Alie Eleveld chair of HENNET; Ms. Racheal Muthoga, deputy Chief Executive Officer of the Kenya Private Sector Alliance (KEPSA); Mr. Meshack Ndolo, Council of Governors (COG); Dr. Hon. Mishra, Swarup Ranjan, Parliamentary Health Committee, unveiled 'THE DYNAMIC' a KHF souvenir magazine that marks the successes and milestones achieved over the years.

In her remarks, Ms. Rachel Muthoga of KEPSA commended the vibrancy of KHF and referred to KHF as a trendsetter among other sector boards affiliated with KEPSA. She encouraged the KHF members in attendance to be business oriented such that, for every challenge in the health space, they work on solutions with efficient business models.

She emphasized that affordability in health promotes access and uptake of services, which makes these crucial areas to look into with advocacy support from KHF and KEPSA, a collaboration she is willing to move forward with.

In his opening remarks, Dr. Amit N. Thakker of the Kenya Healthcare Federation thanked all the partners and members for the collaborative efforts and fruitful partnerships that has seen the federation's growth, especially in advocacy and regional integration. Over the past decade, the federation has partnered with the Ministry of Health in strong advocacy, especially through Presidential Round Table. Ministerial Stakeholder Forum, Devolution Conference, and Kenya Health Forum. Additionally, in 2018 the federation initiated County Stakeholder Forums (CSFs) in five counties including Isiolo, Makueni, Kisumu, Kirinyaga and Mombasa.

Through CSFs, the counties have been able to successfully establish better financing models that will ensure affordability of healthcare.

The chairman reiterated that the federation has marked a growth in membership by 40% in the past one year. KHF has also created partnerships with regional platforms including the East Africa Business Council, East Africa Community, East Africa Health Platform, East Africa Healthcare Federation and Africa Healthcare Federation. The federation looks forward to growing in advocacy, especially offering its expertise to work towards affordable healthcare for all. On his final remarks, Dr. Thakker challenged the private sector to strategize on how to fill the identified gaps in the health sector while delivering affordable healthcare for all. Some of the suggested solutions includes the roll out of innovative affordable private health insurance options to more uninsured Kenyans; investment into specialized treatment facilities through public private partnerships (PPPs); input towards an overarching regulatory framework that will promote financing in both private and public sectors; expansion of health cover to ensure patients can access high quality health services within 5km, expansion of health training to bridge the gap on e-learning and medical training facilities; promotion of cost-effective telemedical services; collaboration with the public sector in medical research and information sharing.

Third Universal Health Coverage Conference

Kisumu County hosted the 3rd Universal Health Coverage Conference from 15th to 17th May 2019 at Grand Royal Swiss Hotel. The theme of the conference was 'Revitalizing Primary Healthcare for Sustainable Universal Health Coverage.' The conference brought together over 800 delegates from national and county governments, parliamentarians, private sector, civil society, faith-based health providers, youth advocates, health professionals and community representatives.

On his opening remarks, Kisumu Deputy Governor, H.E. Dr. Mathew Owili informed the delegates that Kisumu County, being one of the pilot counties, did an analysis gap before the pilot implementation and the conference should answer most of the patient questions towards a successful UHC. Dr. Owili emphasized that Kisumu County needs enough human resources for health, facilities and equipment to successfully implement UHC.

Kenya has made progress towards UHC by improving health outcomes and increasing service coverage. Health insurance coverage is improving and the share of out-of-pocket expenditures has reduced over the last decade.

challenges to UHC include geographical inequities in coverage, socioeconomic inequities in coverage and low public spending on health. Additionally, new institutional, governance and financial frameworks instituted with decentralization need time to be cemented. The World Bank recommended a significant and sustained budgetary commitment in order to control costs and improve quality, which will require a change in incentives and accountability mechanisms with multiple policies. Building supply capacity is critical to assuring delivery of effective services.

This conference brought together the four pilot counties to draw a road map on the implementation plan for UHC, not only for the pilot counties, but also for the rest 47 counties. It was agreed that there should be a clear policy to guide national and county government roles in the implementation of service delivery, that the service of community health workers should be institutionalized and that their training should be based on a defined curriculum to empower them to adequately be part of primary health care with proper remuneration.

Appropriate technology should also be identified and integrated as part of the benefits package in UHC delivery. We need to enact appropriate legislation to facilitate the flow of funds towards health facilities for efficient service delivery. The referral system should be strengthened to link households to community health units and health facilities for appropriate utilization of services. Kisumu County will look into developing a UHC financing model that will take into account a mixed pooling of existing insurance schemes, active purchasing of services through tax finance approach and opportunities for innovative community financing schemes.

Private Sector Policy on the adaptation of standard medical classifications

Health Information Exchange (HIE) is vital in improving healthcare quality, making care more efficient, streamlining administrative tasks, engaging patients and supporting community health. The ICT Data Exchange sub-committee of the Kenya Healthcare Federation has been in strategic discussions to see how health information exchange can be firmed up and made efficient.

Health information exchange can improve the coordination of patient care and decrease inefficiencies and medical errors, allowing health service providers to offer better quality of care at an affordable cost. Both the volume and the quality of point-of-care information and historical patient data are continuously increasing. To enable meaningful use of the data, as well as to safeguard the patient privacy and confidentiality, adequate governance standards and structures are required.

The Data Exchange committee developed a policy position paper, which was discussed in a high level breakfast meeting at IBIS Styles Hotel, Westland on 18th June 2019. The high level participants included: Association of Kenya Insurance, Techno Associates, Carepay, MINET, Smart Applications, Nairobi Hospital, Metropolitan Hospital, HUAWEI, Savannah Informatics, Seven Seas Technology, Phillips Health East Africa and My Dawa.

The KHF-led process will leverage good practice that has made self-governance within the private sector possible. The HIE initiative is expected to use and build on artifacts, methodologies, processes, policy and legislative frameworks that exist to coordinate stakeholders. In addition, the committee reviewed their proposed medical classification standards. This is in accordance to Kenya Standards and Guidelines for e-Health Systems Interoperability, developed in 2015, in consultation with national stakeholders from the private sector, public sector, as well as the World Health Organization Global Team for Classifications and Terminologies.

Some of the key areas that the classification will look at into include: classification of diagnoses, procedures, laboratory tests, medications, commodities, laboratory procedures and clinical evaluations; communication and management of medical imaging, clinical messaging standards, unique identifiers for health providers and patients and a standard format for patient identification technology.
